IV. Tips for Completing Scholarships

1. Never pay to apply for a scholarship!

- 2. Make a scholarship goal, or treat it like a part time job it can pay off! The more you apply to, the higher your chances are of receiving one.
- 3. Search for scholarships for everything that makes you who you are!
- 4. Edit and revise scholarship essays. Seek feedback from teachers, peers & counselors.
- 5. Always ask for letters of recommendation at least 2 weeks before a scholarship is due.
- 6. Make sure all pieces are completed and/or sent in by the deadline (application, essay, test scores, transcripts, letters of recommendation, etc.).
